- a) Each theory subject is evaluated for 100 Marks out of which 60 Marks through semester end examination and internal assessment would be for 40 Marks. The minimum pass mark for external examinations is 21 marks (35%), but as a whole student should obtain 40% marks (40 out of total 100 marks) to pass the subject.
- b) Multi-disciplinary courses (MDC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and Certificate/Value added courses are evaluated for 50 marks out of which 10 marks are be allotted for continuous internal assessment and 40 marks for semester end examination. The minimum pass mark for semester end examination is 16 marks (35%), but as a whole student should obtain 40% marks (20 out of total 50 marks) to pass the subject.

Resolution 8

Resolved to approve the Continuous Internal Assessment pattern for 2025-26 admitted batch.

CIA structure for regular courses (2025-2026 admitted Batch):

- CIA is done for 50 marks out of which 35 marks are allotted for Mid examinations and 15 marks for Cocurricular/ Extracurricular activities.
- In each semester two mid examinations are to be conducted. The question paper consists of 5Marks (2 Out 3 questions), 2Marks (5 out of 7 questions) and 1 Mark Questions (10 out of 10 questions).
- I mid examination is to be conducted for 30 marks and the marks obtained by the student should be scaled down to 20 marks.
- II mid examination is to be conducted for 30 marks and the marks obtained by the student should be scaled down to 15 marks.
- Out of 15 marks allotted for cocurricular/ extracurricular activities, 5 marks are given for assignment, 5 marks for seminar and 5 marks for clean and green (2023-24 and 2024-25 admitted batches).
- For 2025-26 admitted batch, instead of Clean & Green, 5 marks will be given for Quiz/study project.

• 2025-26 admitted students should complete Project work in the subjects and semesters specified below.

Multi-disciplinary courses (MDC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC): for continuous internal assessment, for the allotted 10 marks, five assignments should be submitted by the students and each assignment to be evaluated for 2 marks.

For **Certificate courses** / **Value added courses**, Continuous Internal Assessment is for 10 marks for which regularity of the student, classroom performance to be considered for the evaluation.

Resolution 9

Resolved to approve assessment pattern for the semester-end theory examination for 2025-26 admitted batch.

The model question paper adopted for semester-end examinations consists of:

• For Regular courses: (2025-2026 admitted batch)

External examination is conducted for 60 Marks.

Section- A consisting of 8 Short answer questions out of which the student should

answer any five, each question carrying 4 marks.

Section- B consisting of 5 Essay questions with internal choice, one question from each unit carrying 8 marks.

The composition of the question paper is as per the blueprint given.

• Multi-disciplinary courses (MDC) and Skill Courses (SEC) 2025-2026 admitted batch): External examination is conducted for 40 Marks.

Section- A consisting of 6 Short answer questions i.e., two questions from each unit, out of which the student should answer any four, each question carrying 4 marks.

Section- B consisting of 3 Essay questions with internal choice, one question from each unit carrying 8 marks.

• For certificate courses / Value added courses (40 Marks):

Section- A consisting of 12 very short answer questions (four questions from each unit), out of which the student should answer ten, each question carrying 2 marks.

Section- B consisting of 6 Short answer questions (Two from each unit), out of which the student should answer any **four**, each question carrying 5 marks.

Resolution 10

 Resolved to approve assessment process for Community Service Project, Short-term internship and Semester Internship in following manner.

Community Service Project will be taken up after the I year (2025-26 ad. Batch) II semester end examinations or the summer vacation in the intervening 1st and 2nd years of study for a minimum of 80 hours duration. The assessment is to be conducted for 50 marks. The number of credits assigned is 1. Later the marks are to be converted into grades and grade points to include finally in the SGPA and CGPA.

The weightage shall be:

Socio-economic Survey	10 Marks
Project Survey	10 Marks
Survey analysis and report	20 Marks
Project Presentation	10 Marks

Short-term Internship shall be undertaken by 2024-2025 admitted students in the intervening summer vacation between the 2nd and 3rd years or after the II-year IV semester

end examinations. There will be only internal evaluation for this internship. The assessment is to be conducted for 100 marks and the credits assigned are 4. The marks are converted into grades and grade points to include finally in the SGPA and CGPA.

The weightage shall be:

Project Log	20%
Project Implementation	30%
Project report	25%
Presentation	25%

Semester internship shall be for the entire 6th Semester; the student shall undergo **Apprenticeship / Internship / On the Job Training**. The assessment for the VI Semester long apprenticeship is for **200 marks and credits assigned are 12**. The assessment for this internship / on the job training will be both internal and external. **Internal assessment will be for 25% of marks** which is continuous and assessed by the internal examiner based on the performance of the student. **External assessment is for 75% marks** done by the external examiner by evaluating the Project Presentation made by the student after she reports back to the College, and the grade given by the industry /enterprise / organization where the student does her internship. The marks are converted into grades and grade points to include finally in the SGPA and CGPA.
